

CHSC6800 STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

1. Cite and discuss a number of reasons to teach adults using participatory methods.
2. Demonstrate a number of methods of learning about the characteristics of the students they will be training.
3. Practice methods of orienting trainees and instructors to each other and to the objectives of the training course.
4. Enumerate and employ a number of methods to determine the needs of a community which will be addressed in the training course.
5. Define, compose, and compare a number of tasks that the trainees must be capable of doing to meet the objectives of the course.
6. Design learning objectives that will clarify to the trainees what knowledge, skills, and attitudes they must attain during the class.

 - a) Name and demonstrate training methodologies which will help the trainees develop the knowledge necessary to perform the necessary tasks.
 - b) Name and demonstrate training methodologies which will help the trainees develop the attitudes necessary to perform the necessary tasks.
 - c) Name and demonstrate training methodologies which will help the trainees develop the skills necessary to perform the necessary tasks.
 - d) Construct and arrange learning methodologies according to the complexity of the tasks being learned.
8. Define, explain and demonstrate methodologies for evaluation of whether or not the trainees have met the objectives regarding knowledge and attitudes.
9. Design and set up conditions whereby the trainee will be able to practice the required tasks.
10. Appraise methodologies which evaluate whether the trainees have met the learning objectives regarding specific skills needed.
11. Practice ways to evaluate the general effectiveness of a training course in meeting its goals of training health workers and improving the health of the community.
12. Practice, compare and contrast ways to evaluate and enhance the basic skills of the trainees such as; reading skills, numeration skills, study habits, administrative skills, and social skills.
13. Investigate other issues relating to the training of health workers in developing countries such as:
 - selection of health care workers
 - payment of health care workers
 - type of training of health care workers (continuous vs. block)
 - location of training (in their community vs. central location)
 - oversight of health care workers
 - NGO / Governmental interfacing
 - preventive care vs. curative care emphasis
